Marge Buckley

"The DA's office belongs to the people." With these words, Marge Buckley announced that she will run for District Attorney for Los Angeles County.

Marge says, "The DA is supposed to protect the people and keep the politicians honest." She charges that the office has been used to protect the interests only of the wealthy and powerful, that the victims have been the people Black, Brown, Young, Poor, Worker, Gay, Women. She intends to reverse the process and prosecute those who oppress and prey upon the people.

At a press conference, Marge gave specific examples of the kinds of situations she would investigate and prosecute:

The Board of Supervisors ignored 1964 and 1969 grand jury reports of misuse of monies in the office of Baldo Kristovich, Public Administrator, who handles all the moneys of people who die or who cannot handle their affairs. She promised to investigate the lack of interest shown by the Board of Supervisors.

The heads of the City Planning Commission and the City Planning Department buy land in the boondocks and then announce that the new international airport will be located there. The City Council whitewashes the affair. Marge promised to reopen and investigate the entire matter.

For years people's complaints about police harrassment and brutality have been falling on deaf ears. The police have nullified the U.S. Constitution on the streets. Almost daily we hear of shootings and killings by the police of "suspects", particularly in the ghettos and barrios and in the poor white communities. She says, "While the LAPD whitewashes the Hollywood Division, the vice squad spends the people's money in bars to harrass and entrap gays." She would investigate and prosecute the violence of the police and sherriffs.

Another important investigation will concern the prosecution of the Bobby Kennedy murder case, and the roles of the Board of Supervisors, Police, and DA's office. Thomas Noguchi was pilloried by the County Administrator in an effort to indirectly discredit his autopsy report. The Sirhan gun was never tested by the ballistics expert.

"There's something wrong in many places. It's about time for the DA's office to prosecute the real enemies of the people."

At present the Council is seeking headquarters, office space out of which it can organize the community to get better health services for it. A community coordinator and a community organizer will have to be chosen to further the work of the council. We hope that persons having the best qualifications and the interest of the community at heart will be selected, whether from Venice or not. Being a buddy of someone on the Health Council should not be the way to elect spokesmen of our community.

Ultimately the Venice Health
Council should represent something
big and fine in terms of helping the
poor of our community get better health
care; that is if it stays together and is
not turned around by people out for
their own good only. The Council has
been elected by the people of Venice.
It is truly grassroots and should stay
that way.

Its tentative long range plans include medical training programs, for lab technicians, nurses aides and nurses, testing for sickle cell anemia and a full day care health service as soon as more money and equipment is available.

Shirley Chisholm

Shirley Chisholm: Unbought and Unbossed. Is there a hope for Undirty Politics?

"Ninety-eight pounds and nine feet tall," was the way Shirley Chisholm was introduced to a packed convention center rally sponsered by the National Organization for Women on January 14.

Shirley Chisholm is the newest candidate for the democratic nomination in the race for the presidency.

Throughout her long political career
- better than 25 years - during which
she served on the New York State
Assembly and currently as a member of
the US House of Representatives, Shirley
Chisholm, a strong black woman, has
been noted for speaking her mind.

This rally was no exception. In her speech the former Bedford-Stuyvesant school teacher demonstrated how she gained the reputation for being "unbought and unbossed" - also the title of her autobiography.

"Perhaps the hour has arrived in our country when there's a need for women to run for political high office. And that is not to say I'm against men.

But then who says that high political office, even the presidency, should be the exclusive domain of only one segment of this society? It would be wonderful seeing some other kind of person being president."

 Ms Chisholm addressed herself to those would-be supporters who fear the futility of casting a vote in her favor.

"This may be the real beginning of the implementation of the American dream on its highest level.

"If we are not able to win the nomination, for the first time in the history of this country, if we can go to the convention, we'll have the power of a coalition of forces, women, blacks, the young, that have never had a chance before."

Shirley Chisholm described her tour across the states and the "problem areas" of the nation.

"I've seen poor white children in Kentucky and West Virginia hardly able to stand because of malnutrition, their faces old beyond their years. . .

People's Legal Friend Fired

Marge Buckley, who successfully defended her right to run for office and still remain director of the Venice Legal Services Offices in 1970 has again been fired. Marge, who has been director of the controversial poverty law office since September of 1967, is appealing her dismissal. Charles Jones, executive director of the Legal Aid Foundation claimed there were no political reasons for the firing, that she was being fired for lack of supervisory skills necessary in his new strong centralized program. Marge says, "That's Last February, Tom Mack, regional OEO director told me the office would be closed unless Ken Cloke and I were fired. I refused to quit, so funding for the office was cut off and it was merged with the Legal Aid on June 1, 1971. I was supported by the previous deputy director who himself came out of a community office. He understood that successful poverty community work involved attacking the sources of oppression, which often meant local and federal government agencies as well as the rich and powerful. The government agencies scream when a government-paid lawyer attacks them, 'Activist' lawyers are replaced."

One year ago, F. Caducci, head of OEO in Washington, leaked a story to Evans and Novak , nationally syndicated * columnists, that the Venice office, and all Neighborhood Legal Service Offices in the country with it, was being closed because of the politics of the Venice office, and specifically because of Marge and Ken. The LA Times refused to run the article because it was "libelous" of Marge and Ken.

The politics Washington found distasteful were people's politics. Ken Cloke was involved in representing "Support Our Soldiers", military organizing and draft counselling. The entire office staff, including Marge, has been active in controversial issues:

Venice Canals defense, police harrassment, the Chicano Moratorium, landlordtenant problems, the Tucson grand jury investigations. Marge had run for state Attorney General in 1970 on the Peace and Freedom ticket. She said, "The policy of removing control of the poverty program from the people continues. When the poor demand more, the rich have to get along with less and the government has to give up some of its power. 'Activist' community people who are involved in these programs are

North Beach Master Plan



La Causa Youth Center has established a reputation for success in its second year of operation. All participants in the program were in contact and exposed to the various social services that community agencies and organizations offer. These groups refer students for tutoring. Many presentations before agency staffs, parents, groups, schools and organizations have been made by La Causa participants.

La Causa Youth Center was excellently welcomed and given an affirmative endorsment by the schools on its objectives. Student referrals and educational materials, aside from cooperation from the teachers and counsellors, was supplied by the schools. At the end of the school year of 1971, La Causa Youth Center acted as a referral and placement center for many school youngsters seeking summer employment in the various summer projects in Venice and the surrounding communities. Last summer 350 teenagers were employed.

Cooperation among food conspiracies makes a limited start this month through joint buying of some organic staples.

Topanga food coop will join with three westside groups in ordering and packaging of grains, oils, etc. Conspiracies in Sunset Beach and Highland Park will probably join later. The groups are also exploring ways to operate a joint Wherehouse.

There are now 20 food conspiracies in the LA area, and they are getting it together at a regular inter-coop meeting on the first Sunday of each month. The next conference is at VanNuys on Feb. 6.



The Venice Food Conspiracy is an alternative to buying food in the supermarkets, where people come together once a week to apportion the necessary jobs for food ordering, buying and distributing. The advantages: better food at better prices through community co-operation.

If you want to join, or are just interested in coming to a meeting, they are held every Tuesday at 7:30 pm at 31 Breeze (organic produce), Cumberland Film Co., above the Fox Theater on Lincoln (inorganic produce), 441 Sherman Canal (dairy), and 1781 Washington Way (dry goods).

A hearing was held Thursday Jan 27 to determine if the Free Venice Food Conspiracy should pay three years back business taxes. The decision was postponed pending further "research" by the city. Food Conspiracy attorney Marge Buckley argued that the Conspiracy was the equivalent of a family buying food together. A city official responded that this couldn't be so, since markets in the area report that their business has fallen off.

The editors of the Beachhead report that they feel like they're in a family when buying at the Conspiracy, but the city is not a disinterested party in the dispute. Guess who gets all those back taxes?

One hundred farm workers from Imperial Valley and Santa Maria are descending on Los Angeles every weekend to strengthen the United Farm Workers boycott staff in LA and Orange counties. Together they constitute the largest boycott force ever.

The boycott is directed against nine Napa Valley wineries (Martini, Krug, Sebastiani, Kornell, Korbel, Wente, Weibel, Mondavi, Beringer). These companies refuse to negotiate with their organized vineyard workers. They fight the union by firing employees sympathetic to the Union and beating up Union organizers. Their farm worker housing is notorious. The Luis Martini camp is made up of old railroad boxcars. The Beringer camp is so miserable that some of the shacks have already been condemned.

One day in the first week of January a member of the Venice community was walking beside his place of business when someone yelled, "You! Stop! Come Here!" and almost at the same instant the hand of the speaker grabbed him by the wrist and twisted him into a hammerlock. A second stranger who had been standing by the corner of the building grabbed the victim's other arm with one hand and his throat with

the other. The victim's friends came running out and were about to intervene in what appeared to be a violent robbery, but backed off when they saw that one of the attackers had a gun in a shoulder holster.


Now what would you have done if you had been there? Run to call the police? Well, the friends knew very well the ways of the Venice streets. They didn't race to the phone because they had guessed who the unidentified strangers were. Can you?

It was nothing new in Venice that the police officers with the hammerlocked punched the victim so hard in the back that when the victim was released an hour later he was in constant pain and could hardly walk. It was nothing new that, as soon as he was released, his friends found it necessary to call an ambulance and take him to Marina Mercy Hospital. It was nothing new that no charges were brought against the victim nor was a formal arrest ever made.

What was something new was that the victim had the courage to complain. With the help of local attorney, Marguerite Buckley (who will be running for District Attorney), he has filed a formal complaint with the police department. 'Why can't there be an impartial outside investigation,' you ask? No. The police wouldn't allow it.

The victim's friends figure the attack might have had something to do with the fact that the victim, Calvin Grien, had been working all day every day at La Causa Youth Center where he helped young people and adults to find their Chicano identity and turn their self-defeating habits into constructive channels.

The target of the first farm worker weekend (Jan 8 & 9) was Trader Joe Pronto Markets, a 19 store wine specialty chain. The effectiveness of those two days, combined with the weekday picketing, convinced Trader Joe that fighting the Farm Workers was a losing battle. After losing 8000 customers, Trader Joe removed the scab wine.

The second and third weekends, 30 Ralphs Markets were picketed. A total of 10,450 customers expressed their solidarity with the Farm Workers by refusing to shop there. We had hoped this show of commitment by the farm workers to their cause would reach the hearts and minds of Ralphs executives. To date we have no word from them.

These weekends increase the solidarity between farm workers, boycotters and supporters. The workers from Imperial Valley and Arizona work under contract at lettuce ranches. They volunteer their weekends to the boycott on behalf of their brothers and sisters not yet protected

by contracts. The farm workers from Santa Maria are lettuce strikers. Though they haven't yet won their own struggle, they are working hard on the wine boycott to help the Napa Valley workers win the benefits of union contracts. For those of us on the boycott, working alongside these men and women is an inspiration. And to all the chains like Ralphs and Safeway whose policy is against farm workers, we say, "You will feel the power of this newly merged force in your pocketbooks." UNIDOS GANAREMOS - VIVA LA CAUSA!

We need help from the community to sponser these weekends. We need: people with cars to drive pickets to and from the stores; money and food to provide for the farm workers while they are here. Winding Up The War?

It's been nearly 11 years since the first Green Berets were sent to Vietnam, and still, nearly every day, there is something about the war in the news.

But the kinds of things you see in the news have changed. The news used to be about search and destroy missions and body counts.

Now you hear two things. One is that the war is "winding down", troops are being withdrawn, and it's all over but the shouting. The other is that the bombing raids now are the biggest in the history of the war, or any war.

Just on the surface of it, that doesn't sound straight, when you look at it close, all the loose ends do add up to something, but not to what Nixon's been saying.

One thing Nixon says is true. Troops are being withdrawn. There used to be more than half a million ground troops. By spring there are supposed to be less than 100,000.

That's still a lot of soldiers. When will the rest be withdrawn? According to the president, never. The policy of "winding down the war" requires what

Nixon calls a "residual force." That means that Nixon wants to leave tens of thousands of GIs in Southeast Asia



for years to come.

When Johnson sent 100,00 soldiers to Vietnam, we all thought he was starting a war. Now that Nixon is going to leave that many over there, we're supposed to believe the war is over.

City Stomps Our Recycling — Starts Own

The City of Los Angeles is planning to start a recycling center in Venice, as part of a six-month pilot project. The center will open February 12th at the Sewer Maintenance Yard, 3233 Thatcher Av, with hours 9 am to 5 pm, Saturdays only. The Center will accept glass, aluminum and steel cans, and plastic milk bottles, but no newspapers. The center will be staffed solely by City employees.

The City's project has been criticized by some L.A. area recycling groups. It has been charged that the City has not made adequate use of the experience of volunteer recycling groups. Some people have even said the project is doomed to failure.

Israel Feuer of Ecology Action in West L.A. called the City's project "Johnny-come-lately tokenism," though he commends the City for its interest in recycling. He said, "In view of the experience of volunteer groups, it represents no advance. The City is attempting in a half-hearted but better financed fashion to do what volunteer groups have been doing for over a year." He said the City project needs a long-term commitment to recycling so that people can depend on a center's continued existence and volunteer groups can shut down.

The Beachhead certainly encourages people to participate in this project. But we must ask just how deep runs the City's concern with cleaning up the environment. Posters will be proclaiming, "Mayor Sam wants you. Join the Saturday Reclamation Corps." This is the same mayor that stopped the separation of garbage by households, and once accused environmentalists of being against "progress."

While the City Administrative Office was planning recycling centers, the De-

partment of Building and Safety has been harassing Free Venice recycling centers. Most recently, a small neighborhood center in the Canals has been cited. The City is trying to claim that a mere three cans constitute a "reclamation center" like the plants in Central L.A., and is therefore not permitted in a residential zone. The citation also claims that the recycling center is not permitted under the Venice Canal project legislation currently being challenged in the courts.

The City seems unwilling to give the recycling center the legal status of garbage cans, though this would be a simple move. We all know that many apartment buildings have more that three garbage cans, and a recycling center could hardly be more objectionable. The Government is prone to making statements that their idol called the Law must always be obeyed. In reality, the Government selects which laws are enforced against whom. For instance, anti-pollution laws are not enforced against polluting corporations.

Seen in this light, the City's motives for starting recycling centers appear purely political. The project was planned in close cooperation with the public relations firm for the glass container industry. The City seems to be saying that Industry is doing its part, and now the consumers have to come through.

In fact, corporations, and not individuals are responsible for pollution are wastage of resources. The glass container industry makes crap and brainwashes people into buying it. The eventual aim of recyling must be the abolition of the glass container industry. The City's program smells like a public relations scheme designed to divert people's attention away from the real culprits in the environmental crisis. How does Nixon expect to win a war with less than 100,000 men when he couldn't do it with 500,000? To the policy-makers that's a question of strategy.

For years the strategy was based on American ground forces. But the U S Army was not defeating the Vietnamese. Instead, the presence of foreign soldiers turned hundreds of thousands of them away from the Saigon government, the US Army became demoralized, and most Americans back home ended up being against the war.

That put Nixon in a bind. On the one hand, the strong economic interests that originally started the war wanted it to continue. But Nixon knew that most of the people opposed the war. He needed a new strategy that could continue the war, and still make it look like the war was ending.

Withdrawing some ground troops makes it look like the war is ending.
Then how can be continue the war?

The new strategy is based on air power and sophisticated electronic equipment. There are still 1000 US airplanes based in Indochina, and at least two aircraft carriers with more than 80 planes on each.

During the last few months when the war has been winding down, the rate of bombing has been 50% higher than the rate on all fronts in World War II at any time.

Behind all the talk about winding down the war, Nixon is trying a new way to maintain American control in Southeast Asia.

Actually there is no reason to think the strategy will work. All the years of bombing have never effectively reduced the military capability of the Vietnamese armed forces.

The reasons for this is something the US war-makers won't admit. Most Vietnamese, to a greater or lesser extent, actually do support 'the other side', and see the US and the Saigon government as their enemies.

The new strategy isn't winning the war, but it has taken a high toll of Vietnamese lives.

Over the years millions of Vietnamese people have been killed, and millions more made homeless by the bombing. The new electronic equipment is supposed to pinpoint population centers for bombing raids. As a result, village after village is being destroyed; killing civilians is easier under the new strategy than it was for Lt. Calley.

The next time you see in the news that the "war is winding down", remember that it's a trick, and not the first that a president has tried to play on the American people.

If someone told you that in a country the size of California there were 100,000 foreign troops, taking 30 casualties a week, and that they were using 1000 airplanes to drop 74,000 tons of bombs each month, you'd probably think there was a war going on. There is.

Women and the War

Women and the War is a group of Women who have been in the Women's Liberation Movement who are trying to reach women concerning the connection between the fight for Women's liberation and the fight to end the war in Indochina. Illegal War Tax

The 10% Federal Excise Tax on your phone bill nets the government over \$1.6 billion a year to spend on murder and destruction. The telephone excise tax which gained Congress's approval in 1966, was proclaimed specifically to support the Vietnam "operation", an undeclared illegal war. We can help end the war by showing mounting opposition to it by withholding the revenue the government needs to wage it.

Set a precedent for resistance. In the form of a lawsuit (with an injunction to restrain the government from collecting the telephone tax) they are in the process of trying the federal government in court to finance a war when no war has been declared. We in Southern California are beginning a court suit, and urging all telephone subscribers to join the case. The suit will also serve as an educational vehicle for us to learn about our tax system and the war.

Answer Crime

Crime in the streets is increasing. Rapes burglaries and muggings are what we are talking about. The FBI says crime has increased by 99% since 1960. Well, what has happened since 1960 to cause the increase? It is the Vietnam War. It is the pouring of billions of dollars into a war while neglecting the needs of the people at home. It is the complete destruction of a peace-time morality and a focus on killing. It is the mystique of masculine power the Machismo - mixed with racism that exists in American aggression in Vietnam and in the ghettos of America.

In the ghettos, like Venice, the dope menace brings crime in the streets to the fore. Drug addicts have to steal to support their habit. Speed has pushed the rape figures up, and rape charges were always a good way to frame Blacks and Chicanos. The unemployment rate among the young and poor means frustration and despair. Sixty cases of overdose deaths in Venice among the young last year (that are known). Kids in school are popping pills because they can't relate to school and the whole scene of an empty hip culture.

In order to deal with the epidemic, we need to take a good hard look at the problems which are oppressing so many people in this country. We need to take a look at the prison system, which is an academy of crime. We need to see how justice works in favor of the mafia and the rich, to understand why the prisons are full of the poor. We need also to examine the ways of the police.

Police Chief Davis says that crime in the streets is caused by the lenient court system, turning the criminals loose. (A criminal to him is one who steals when he's hungry, but not the 200 big corporations who don't pay income tax) And what is his remedy for the crime epidemic? More police.

Wind Down The Prisons

Letters from Prison to the Beachhead and its friends in response to our appeal to our readers to send correspondence to our brothers behind bars.

(To La Causa people) Friend T,

From information I received here at max., I feel a tremendous love for everyone who became conscious of my plight and took an active role to eliminate or expose the conspiracy against me which in turn is against all of us.

Since the beginning of December after I was arrested by Venice and then Santa Monica, I knew a trap was being formulated. In Venice they tried to incite me into a fight, in Santa Monica they asked how come I was not deported to Panama, When I said I was a citizen, they said it was best I take a one way vacation.

The conspiracy between the Dept. of Correction and the Venice PD is to eliminate leadership. I expected something to happen to me for the last three weeks I was out, but not in this manner. In a way this is like preventive detention to keep me separated from everyone so the complaint I filed will fall apart or else justify their actions, in another way. I know you know most of this, but it's good to bear in mind that we must struggle together.

In Sacramento, the Adult Authority voted to upset the indeterminate sentence. At long last Is this the beginning of breaking the absolute power prison authorities have over prisoners? We doubt it. The prison system is, and will continue to be, if unchallenged, a power which looks on prisoners as unworthy human beings.

Therefore, it feels it can do with prisoners what it wants. Sentences, even if known to prisoners, are largely punitive and evidence of racial discrimination in sentencing is strong. Nevertheless, Adult Authority in California may be coming to the realization that they'd better loosen up the reins a bit. After all 55.7% of male prisoners in California (Dept. of Corrections figure) are there for robbery, burglary and narcotics. To be totally abusive and repressive against such minor criminals is stupid. Especially since prisoners have begun to fight the antiquated prison system when they learned they had nothing to lose but their chains. . .

But Manley J. Bowler of the panel from Los Angeles voted for keeping the indeterminate sentence. He said the prisoner today is a different human animal. "We're getting the scrapage of the bottom of the barrel."What Manley J. Bowler means is that prisoners are learning to fight back and that's why they are confined as "troublemakers" to solitary cages in adjustment centers.

This is the story of Luis Talamantez, and that of the other San Quentin six. Luis entered prison for narcotics which if actually was using, was an escape from the racist society he lived in. He was then convicted of robbery (why did he not have enough money to live on - if he did steal?). He is still there after eleven years because he "doesn't cooperate".

Today he is charged with conspiracy to murder San Quentin guards, a charge which is totally fabricated. Press Burns

On January 9th, the Peace Press at 2732 La Cienega Blvd., was destroyed by fire. For three and a half years the Peace Press has functioned as the major movement printing outlet for Southern California. The Press began in 1968 to provide the literature for the Resistance and S.D.S. Several of the printers felt that this service, if expanded, could serve a wider range of movement politics. The Press staff grew, attracting people with widely divergent political backgrounds. By working at subsistence wages the Press was able to print cheaply for over 200 different movement groups and set aside money to payoff new equipment.

In the past year though, the Press has been hit by \$8000 in burglaries, several rip-off accounts and the fire. At this point the Press has lost all of its equipment. Thanks to beautiful

Wounded Vets

The Veterans Administration in West LA is in the process of evicting over 1200 patient members who were being cared for and living at the extended care hospital. These patients are being evicted with so little notice (5 days) that the hardships and anxiety are unbelievable. The VA alleges that the reason they are acting in such a manner is that part of the installation is unsafe. We do not argue this point, only the manner in which the VA has seen fit to deal with the patients. They are sending some as far away as Temple Texas and without the consent of the patients.

The VA has been found to be on top of a large oil deposit that may be worth a large amount of money to Alladin and Occidental Oil who own the rights to it. Or it may be that land speculators would like an opportunity to build some high rises on the choice land.

We are not sure why the VA is doing what it is, but we do know we are going to do everything in our power to stop them. The Venice Legal Aid office has started legal proceedings, and the Cal-Vets group and the patients have begun to demonstrate and publicly air their complaints. Venice Service Center

People in the community have expressed dissatisfaction with the cutoff of services at the Venice Service Center. The state Service Center at Lincoln and Rose did start out as a place where people of Venice went for every kind of information, legal help and welfare needed by the poor and powerless. The Community Board of the

Service Center which is made up of representatives from some of the antipoverty programs, and from the Police, did talk about the matter that the Center is now a job application and screening agency. The only jobs, almost, that they have in the office, are the jobs occupied by the staff, with control by people from outside the community.

Police Spy Uncovered

It was the summer of 1971 and Bob Navarro came to La Causa Youth Center to apply for a job. La Causa was doing tutoring of young Chicenos and carrying on programs for young people out of school for the summer. Navarro passed himself off as a college graduate who was interested in working with young Chicanos. And he was hired.

Although Bob Navarro fooled some people in the Chicano movement of Venice for a short time, this Judas was unmasked as an undercover agent at the Chicano Moratorium rally in East Los Angeles. But before this happened, there were suspicions aroused when it

was proved that he was lying about his work application. Actually, the school Bob Navarro graduated from was the Police Academy where he is wanted only to be used against his own people as an undercover agent.

Bob Navarro walked the picket line at EYOA. But he was afraid of being found out under that Fu Manchu moustache and long hair. He knew that the police were trying to discredit the Chicano movement in Venice, and for a few pieces of silver, he was ready to serve against the cause and against his own people.

Since Bob Navarro has been caught as a traitor against his people he has tried to take on a new identity. He shaved his moustache and got himself a crew haircut but put on those hippy eyeglasses. He won't fool anybody. He has a slimy purpose. Cuidado amigos, he may offer you a cigarette, a drink, or even a joint, and he is dangerous. This agent is 5 feet 9 inches tall, of medium build, drives a gray Volkswagen and speaks a miserable Spanish.


Landlord Piggery
