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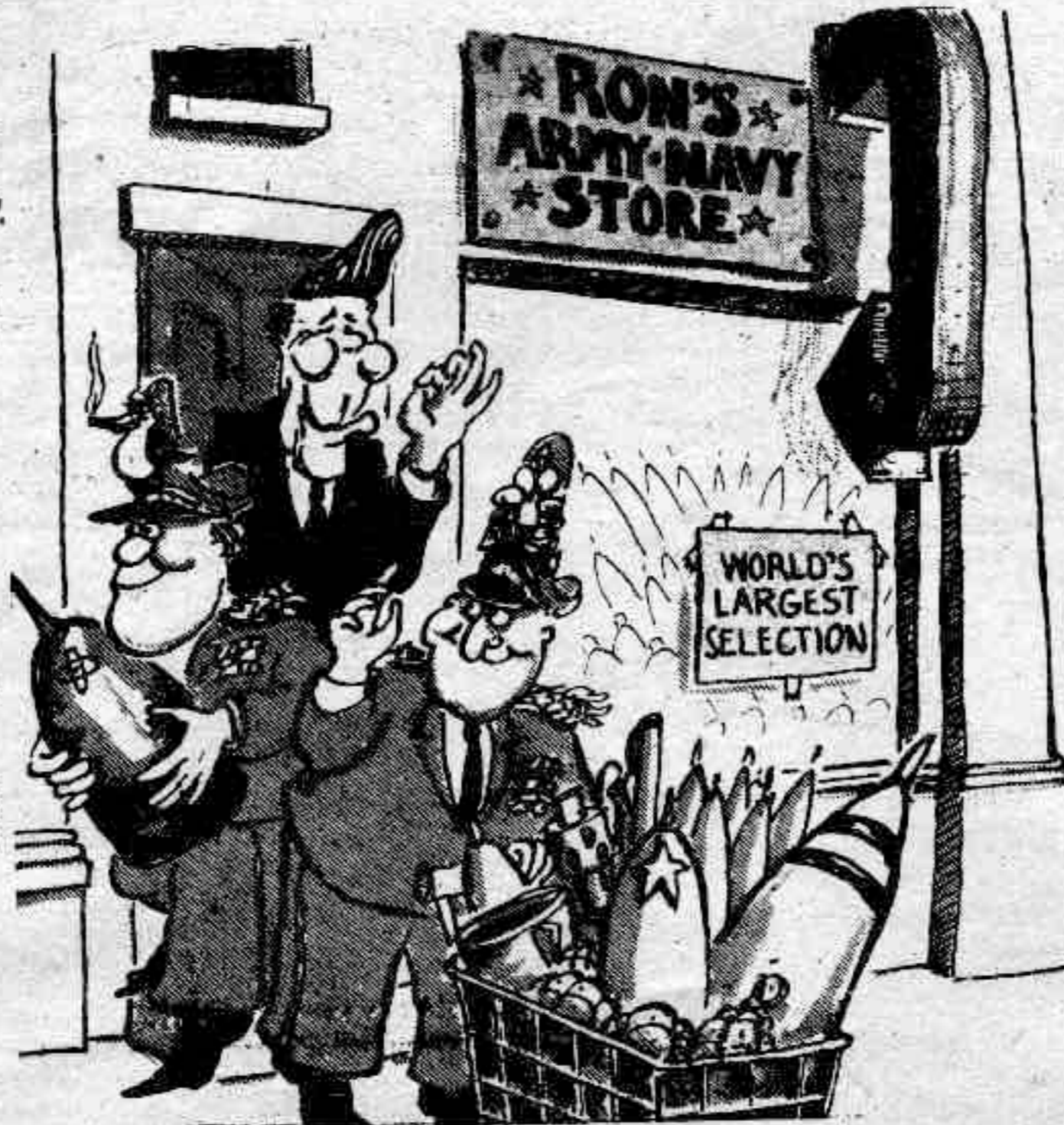

## STOP REAGAN'S WARS!

Imagine driving down the streets of Los Angeles and seeing billboards which say "No Vietnam Wars in Central America". Picture walking down a street in your neighborhood and seeing signs exclaiming the same message displayed in the window of people's homes. Just sit back and contemplate the amount of political pressure placed upon the Congress and the Reagan Administration to HALT the illegal and immoral war which they are dragging our country into in Central America and the Caribbean brought about by massive demonstrations by American citizens of on going, visible, and active opposition to U.S. intervention in this region.

The time has come to stop imagining and to act! The U.S. Govt. is currently spending over \$700,000 each day to prop up the repressive military junta in El Salvador which since 1979 has murdered over 42,000 civilians. The Reagan Administration is currently waging a two prong war of economic sabotage and of military aggression via the CIA-backed 'contras' against the country of Nicaragua. In 1983 alone over six hundred Nicaraguans were killed in 'contra' attacks. The New York Times recently noted that "the Reagan Administrations efforts to destabilize the Sandinista (Nicaraguan) Government...have included vetoes of loans from...multinational lending institutions...., a sharp reduction in U.S. purchases of Nicaraguan sugar, and an almost complete cut off of official aid."



How can we as concerned citizens show our grave concerns that these policies, so reminiscent of the military escalation which led to the Vietnam War, are leading our country into a quagmire of military involvement in Central America? Heres how! During the months ahead CISPES (The Committee in Solidarity with the People of El Salvador) will be conducting a nationwide campaign to bring together thousands of concerned people to stand in open opposition to Reagan's war in Central America. This Campaign

is called THE NATIONAL NEIGHBORHOOD PROTEST AGAINST U.S. INTERVENTION IN CENTRAL AMERICA AND THE CARIBBEAN. The National Neighborhood Protest consists of: 1) putting up billboards equating the Central American crisis to the Vietnam War (the first set of billboards are designated to go up on Nov. 1, with one planned for Lincoln Bl.), 2) getting people to put up window signs and bumper stickers saying "No Vietnam Wars in Central America", 3) mass demonstrations on November 12th in Wash. D.C. and here in Los Angeles at Mac Arthur Park, and 4) a Congressional letter campaign. Volunteers will be canvassing door to door in the neighborhoods of LA talking to people about the situation in Central America and raising funds for the billboards as well as distributing the window signs and Congressional letters. What is unique about this campaign is that it will be taking place in our neighborhoods because it is up to us to stop the death and destruction our Govt. is unleashing onto the people of Central America.

The next canvass will be taking place here in the West LA/ Venice area on November 6th with others taking place in the near future. Remember it is only through our actions here at home that the injustices maintained by the U.S. Government abroad be halted. ■

## Neighbors Nix Nukes

A proposed Nuclear Free Santa Monica Charter Amendment states that "No person, corporation, educational facility, laboratory, institution or other entity shall, within the city of Santa Monica, knowingly or intentionally engage in the following activities: development, testing, production, maintenance, storage, transportation, or disposal of nuclear weapons or components, or applied nuclear research." This ballot initiative for the November 1984 general election was initiated by Citizens for a Nuclear Free Santa Monica. Starting this month area residents will fan out with petitions into workplaces, among friends and family, and anywhere else registered Santa Monicans can be found. To qualify for the ballot, 7,000 valid signatures must be obtained by next April.

The nuclear free zone movement is blossoming around the world. The city of Manchester England adopted a nuclear free zone resolution in 1980, and was followed by 160 towns, cities and countries. In Wales the movement proceeded county-by-county until the entire country was finally declared a nuclear free zone. Australia, as an outgrowth of the anti-uranium mining campaign led by Helen Caldicott, has over a dozen.

The US currently has 23 declared nuclear free zones, all small cities and towns with no entrenched nuclear missile components makers. That all changes this month with the vote on Nuclear Free Cambridge, Mass., home of nuclear think tank Draper Labs and several large nuclear manufacturers. Santa Monica, home to Rand Corporation as well as the inter-

national headquarters of Lear Siegler, with complicity in Cruise and Pershing missiles, will likewise assure a front row position in the developing struggle.

A national group in Baltimore, Nuclear Free America, provides informational services, and has a staff of lawyers to advise people on the free zoning process. Nearer to home, the Nuclear Free Zone Registry near Riverside does presentations and distributes window stickers which proclaim any small area a nuclear free zone. They also register NFZ's. This

month Nuclear Free Zone Registry is sponsoring an educational event intended to help Southern California activists fathom the complexities of corporation formation and the conduct of the campaign NFZ campaigns are in various stages all around the Southland, including Santa Barbara, Ojai, Claremont, and (a toughie) San Diego. All this will happen right here at the Church in Ocean Park November 19, 12 - 6pm, \$6 at the door, \$4 in advance. This most exciting and upbeat evolution in back yard activism can sustain the efforts of many thoughtful people. Volunteer positions now opening up in (anti) aerospace: collect signatures, sell gorgeous dove shirts in 4 hot styles or become a speaker. Training is now in progress. So mark it down: November 19, and get on down to the Nuclear Free Church in Ocean Park. ■

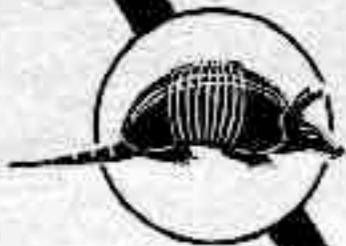
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## A University is Jailed

I had planned to write a report on what we, Friends of the University of El Salvador, feel was a very successful national tour of Dr. Parada, President of the University (see article in the September Beachhead). But due to lack of space in this issue, I want to just make an appeal for your immediate action concerning the most recent murders and disappearances of faculty and students at the University of El Salvador.

Since Dr. Parada's return to El Salvador in early October the following persons have been killed or are missing:

Dra. Munoz Castillo, faculty member from the Department of Chemistry and Pharmacy (dead);

Lic. Manuel de Jesus Baires Zelaya, Secretary of the Engineering and Architectural Department (dead);

Bachiller Pedro Flores Pena, student representative before the Board of Directors of the Faculty of Jurisprudence and Social Sciences (dead);

Lic. Ricardo Ernesto Calderon, General Secretary of the University (disappeared);

Lic. Hugo Francisco Carrillo Cabrera, main representative of the Department of International Relations from the Faculty of Jurisprudence and Social Sciences (disappeared);

Lic. Manuel de Jesus Villalobos, Faculty of Law (disappeared);

Dr. Amilgar Martinez Olguera, Professor, Department of International Relations (disappeared).

Dr. Parada has also received death threats from the civilian "death squads" that operate freely in El Salvador.

The University was closed by the military in 1980. The president was assassinated and the deans and faculty were arrested and held for 45 days. The Consejo Superior Universitario, the University's highest ruling body, voted to continue to function; a decision that was based on the belief that part of their function would be to continue to criticize the military government. The University continues to operate out of store fronts, apartments, wherever space is available.

I ask you to write a personal letter to: Excelentissimo Alvaro Magana Presidente de la Republica de El Salvador, Casa Presidential, San Salvador, El Salvador. It would also be important if you would send a copy, or another letter, to Dr. Henry Kissinger's Commission in Washington, D.C. Kissinger has been quoted in the Los Angeles Times as warning the Salvadoran government about the need to do something about human rights if they expect to continue to get U.S. aid.

If you feel that you have sufficient information on the conditions in El Salvador to write a letter, do so; if not, call or write the various organizations working on Central America. If you want more information on the University of El Salvador call me at 396-6876.

A letter asking for information concerning those listed above would be very important. We would appreciate a copy of any letter and reply. Send them to the Friends of the University of El Salvador, 226 San Juan Avenue, Venice, California 90291. ■

EDUCATIONALS

At the first educational meeting of the Santa Monica-Venice Chapter of the Peace and Freedom Party three members of the Committee in Solidarity with the People of Palestine presented an interesting program. The first speaker, Lebanese born Elie Chalaba, provided background information and explained the current situation of Lebanon. He skillfully portrayed the multi-dimensional struggle occurring there. The diverse needs and desires of the politically, religiously and economically mixed Lebanese became apparent. Living in a country which is distinct from its neighboring nations, the inhabitants themselves come from many different groups of people. His talk was concluded with ideas about the possible solutions to the conflict which is destroying the country.

The next section of the program was a narrated slide show about Israel presented by Diane James. While living in Israel as a member of a work group, she travelled throughout Israel. Her slides show the effects of the Israeli settlement policy on the land and the people inhabiting the West Bank. A side of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict rarely shown in this country was revealed.

The evening concluded with an informal discussion lead by Ed Keenan on the censorship Israel imposes on the press and communications channels in Palestine and Israel. Keenan, who taught in Israel, discussed the residence, work and production limits placed on the Palestinians by the Israeli government. All three presentations were given in the spirit of education and not as invectives against the Israeli government or people. It is certainly clear that the press in this country has not attempted to objectively report both sides of the Palestinian problem.

Santa Monica-Venice Chapter of Peace and Freedom Party presents a program of educational and sometimes controversial content on the first Sunday of every month. On Sunday, November 6th, at 7:30pm, the program is Choice or Chance, a slide/tape show. The place is 1354 W. Washington Bl., Venice. Subjects covered in this film include draft resistance, anti-recruitment and the poverty draft. Discussion will follow. This program is valuable for anyone who has reached registration age or who knows someone who is at that age. Drop in, have a cup of coffee, and join us for the program.

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STERILIZATION MEANS GENOCIDE IN PUERTO RICO

The October issue of Ms. magazine contained an article of interest to all concerned people. It exposed a recent epidemic among Puerto Rican children which can be traced to the practices of U.S. corporations on the island. According to this article, more than 2000 children, mostly young girls, show signs of early sexual development, including breast development before the age of nine, menstruation as early as nine months of age, growth of pubic and underarm hair and stunted growth.

Medical experts put the rate of occurrence of this syndrome in the U.S. at one in 10,000, while in Puerto Rico it has attained the epidemic level of one in 50 children. The apparent cause is high levels of chemical estrogens in local meat. DES, a proven carcinogen which has been banned by the FDA, is readily available in Puerto Rico, where all DES made by U.S. pharmaceuticals is produced. U.S. meat producers on the island are suspected of using the drug to promote rapid fattening of chicken and cattle for market. The drug is known to cause uterine cancer in adults. 13% of the children affected in Puerto Rico have ovarian cysts which could cause infertility or cancer, as well. Meanwhile, the FDA continues to deny that there is a problem.

This situation typifies Puerto Rico's colonial relationship to the U.S. Environmental pollution and/or medical experimentation which would be impossible in the U.S. are routinely imposed on Puerto Ricans. In the 1950's, Puerto Rico was the laboratory for testing contraceptives including the pill. Most horrendously, it has also been the target of a massive sterilization campaign. Under the direction of U.S. population control programs, 40% of Puerto Rican women and 25% of the men have been surgically sterilized (the highest rate in the world). The average age of sterilization is also the world's lowest, 26 years.

All this acquires added significance in the light of U.S. intentions to use Puerto Rico as the major military base for intervention in Central America and to mine its central mountains for strategic metals used in war industries. Systematic depopulation of the island is consistent with attempts to secure U.S. bases and resources. These genocidal strategies are being met with resistance by the Puerto Rican independence movement. It is a movement that should have the support of all progressive people opposed to U.S. war and intervention.

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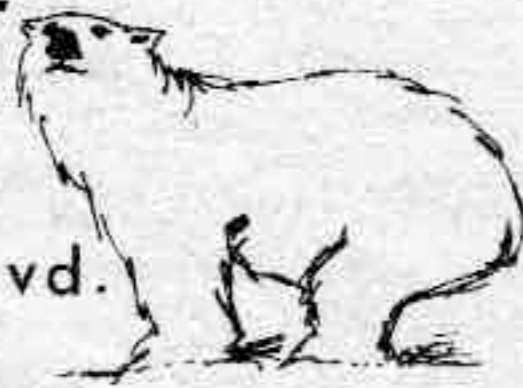
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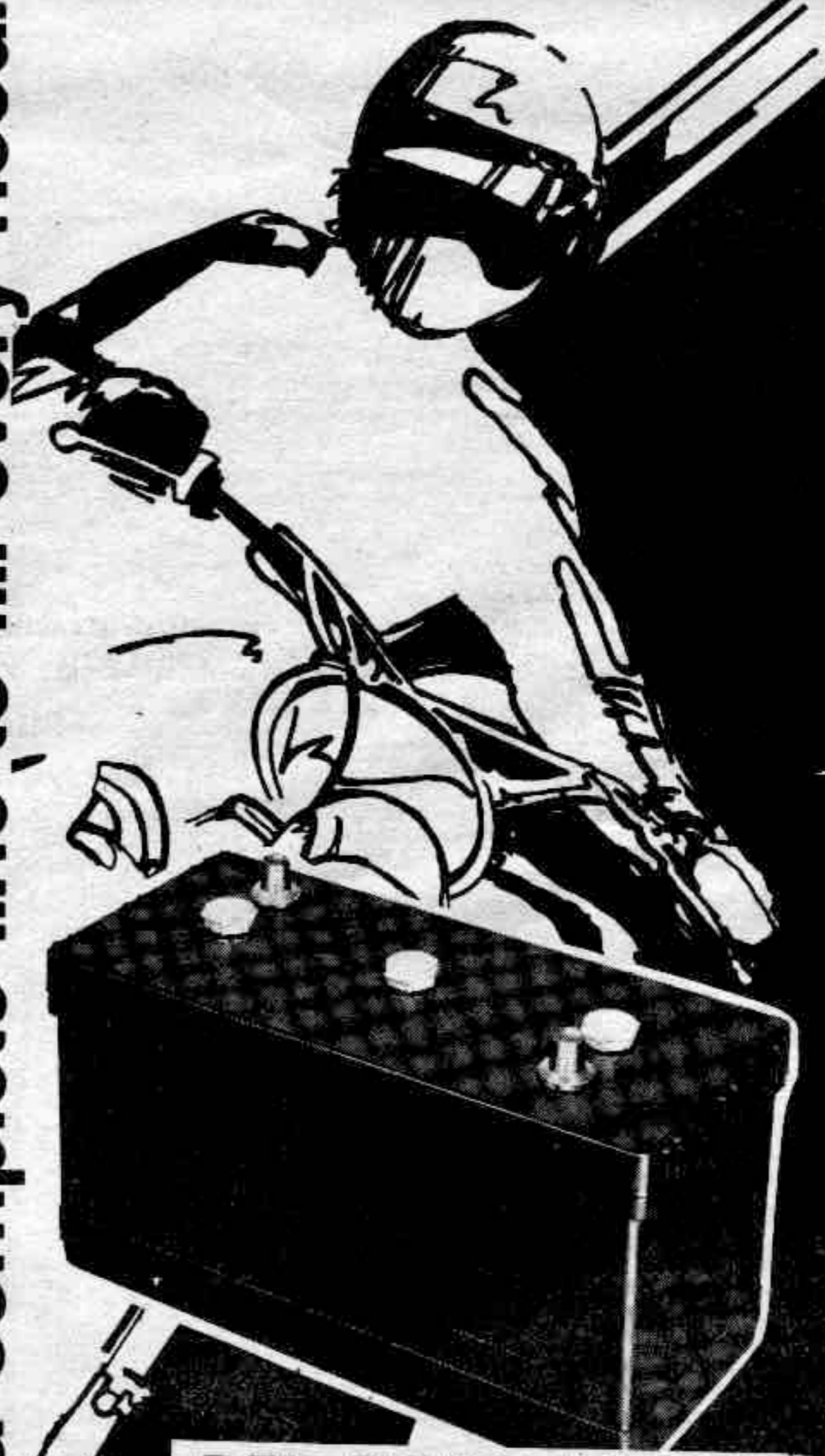
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# Giant Kite Kills Its Maker

On the day of September 24, 1983, Steve Edeiken, 30, husband and father of two, died of injuries suffered in a bizarre accident. He was taking part in the launching of the world's largest kite. The kite has as much surface area as a football field. It was necessary to tether it to two dump trucks filled with sand. Prior to launching, Steve and the launch team made final adjustments to the many stabilizing lines and the thousands of yards of colorful sail cloth. The wind had been mild all day but was picking up as final preparations were made for launch. The billowy cloth seemed anxious to fly.

As the lift-off got under way, everyone was excited. The wind came up as if on cue and the huge kite began to ascend. Suddenly a gust took the kite up at an alarming rate. Somehow Steve's leg became entangled in the guide lines.



He was hauled aloft, almost instantly, more than a hundred feet into the air. He managed to right himself and hung by his hands briefly. He was a man of great strength and so the forces at play must have been tremendous, for he couldn't maintain his grip. Hundreds of spectators and friends watched helplessly from below as he fell to his death. It all happened so quickly, there was very little, if anything, that might have been done. He was taken to a local hospital in Ilwaco, Washington, the site of the event, where he was pronounced dead.

Steve started his kite business in the garage which I now occupy. There is still an old kite template covering a hole in the concrete. There are some shelves he made of scrap lumber from my shop next door. One of the boards has been written on by his step-daughter, Skye. "I LOVE MY MOTHER" it says. Steve had nailed it so it could be easily read.

Before the kite business, Steve was a carpenter. We worked together. I always looked forward to working with him. No problem was insurmountable as far as he was concerned. He taught me a great deal about the virtues of positive thinking. His very attitude helped me to hit the nail more squarely...cut the line more accurately. He imparted a great sense of dignity to work. He made it fascinating. We would come home dog tired, but he would come here, to the garage, and manufacture kites until late at night. The orders from friends and friends of friends kept coming in.

One day he announced that he was going to devote full time to designing and manufacturing stunt kites. The whole family pitched in. Less than three years later the "RAINBOW KITE CO." was a well-established business with an international reputation. We, his friends and neighbors, looked on with admiration as this twenty-six-year-old man shouldered his responsibilities, made his way through the jungles of self-doubt that we all must confront, and, in the end, achieved things that were even beyond his own substantial goals.

And so his death stunned us all. It had the ring of fiction. No one could quite believe it. After the shock we realize our loss. His life spirit lifted us all. Children flocked around him. He was the guy everyone liked. Thousands of anonymous admirers have been entertained by the long "trains" of rainbow stunt kites that have decorated the Venice sky-line in recent years. Few knew the man at the other end of the lines. He was the man who started it all. He was a maker of joy, of lofty ideals and, ultimately, of the history of Venice. He inspired us to look beyond our pettiness and to raise our vision. What greater gift might we have received? It is left for us to nurture the principles he embraced.

He is at peace but for the anguish his family must suffer. And our own great sense of loss is minor by comparison. What words of consolation are adequate? But for the hand of God, or at least cosmic sanity, we might agonize in despair. Yet Steve would insist we overcome such lethargy of faith and strive toward a better order of things. These wonderful kites and colors were not simply the incidental materials of a business...they are the stuff of childhood's dreams...visions of fancy...inspiration toward high ideals and achievement. Let us all be so inspired. In his parting from these times, Steve leaves us with the courage to aim at our own dreams. A good friend said "He will live in our memories forever." It should be a good place for him to reside. ●

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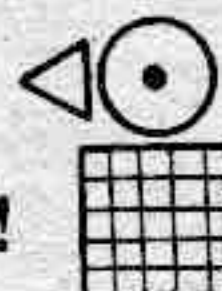
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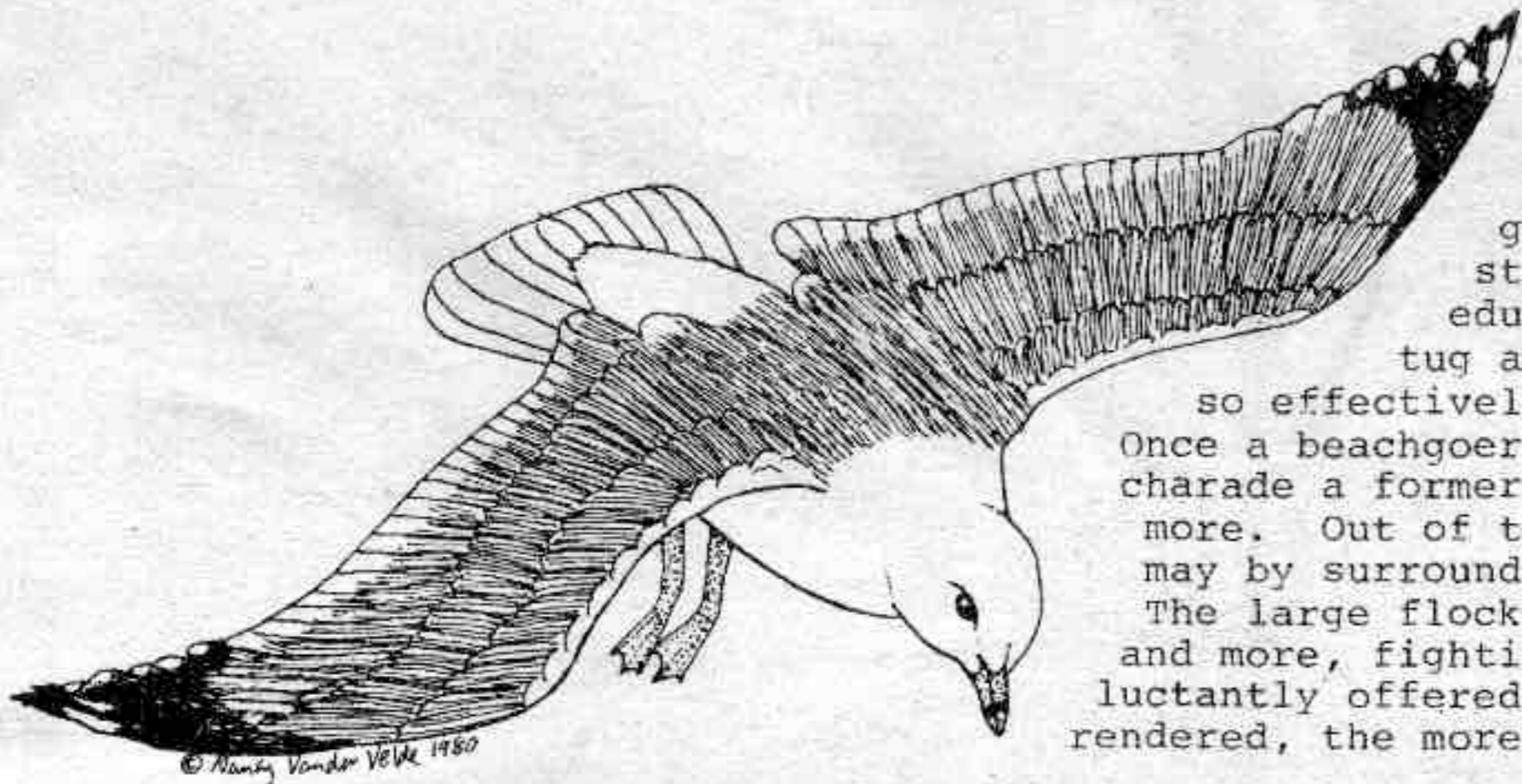
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# FOR THE BIRDS

A Tribute to Chee Wah Wah

With the opening of a lunch sack at any beach, groups of gulls appear and start begging for food. No educated dog or cat could tug at a person's heart string so effectively.

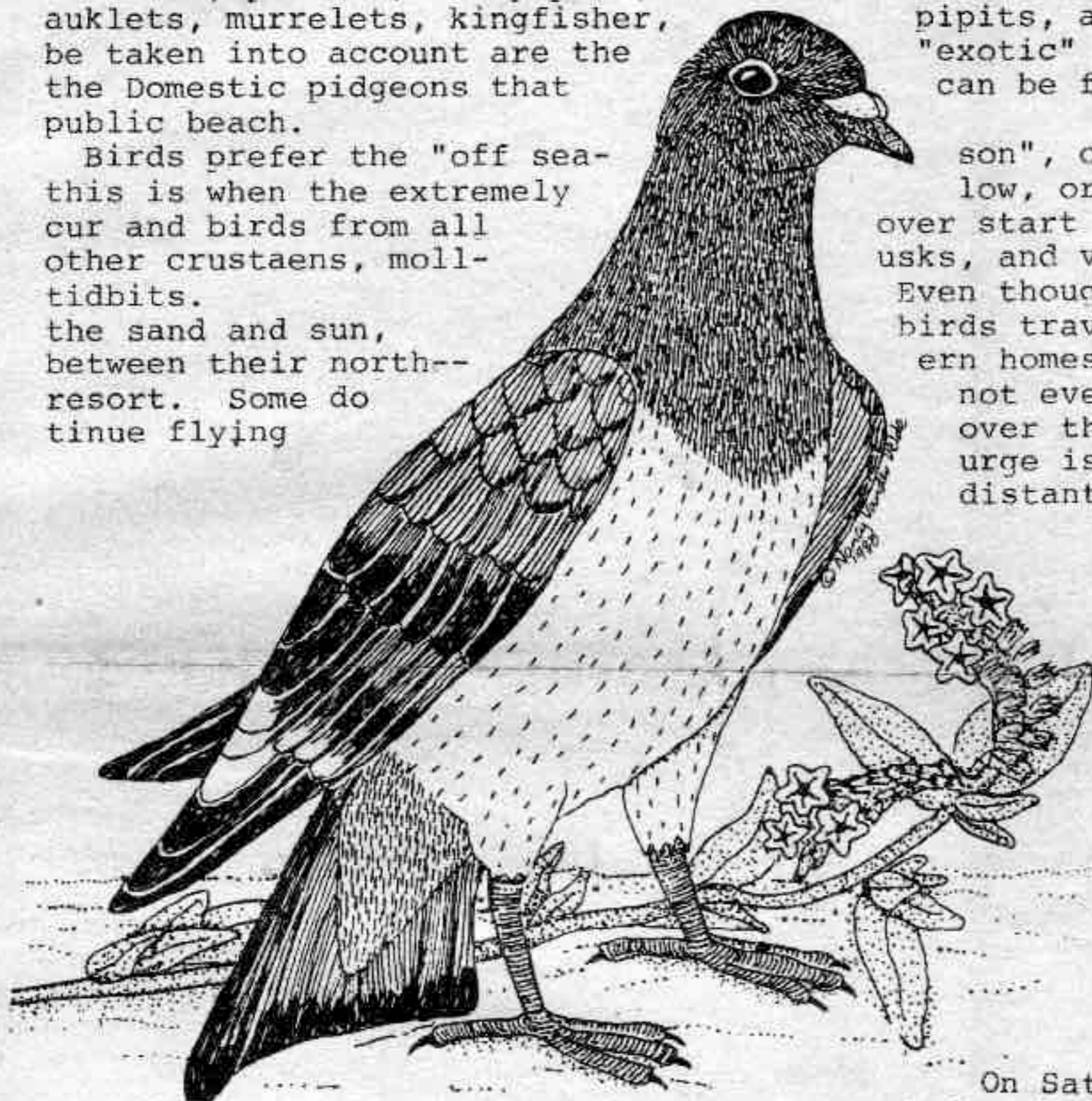
Once a beachgoer is taken by the birds' charade a formerly peaceful lunch is no more. Out of thin air, the brown bagger may be surrounded by dozens of gulls. The large flock noisily squawks for more and more, fighting over whatever is reluctantly offered. The more that is surrendered, the more they demand.

About a dozen species of gulls can be seen along the So. Cal. coast. These are the Western, Ring-billed, Glaucous-winged, California, Herring, Heermann's, Bonaparte's and Franklin's Gull. In general, they all look so similar, they are essentially impossible for amateur birders to tell adults apart.

Most gulls are scavengers, feeding on dead fish or other refuse along the shore. Herring Gulls drop clams, while in flight, in order to break them open and feed on the soft animal inside. Many gulls enjoy the similar tastes of grasshoppers and other flying insects caught in midair.

It is unfortunate that the ill-behaved gulls dominate the popular impression of maritime birds. Other more polite shore birds include loons, grebes, pelicans, cormorants, herons, scoters, mergansers, ospreys, coots, oyster-catchers, plovers, sandpipers, avocets, stilts, phalaropes, terns, pipits, and swallows. 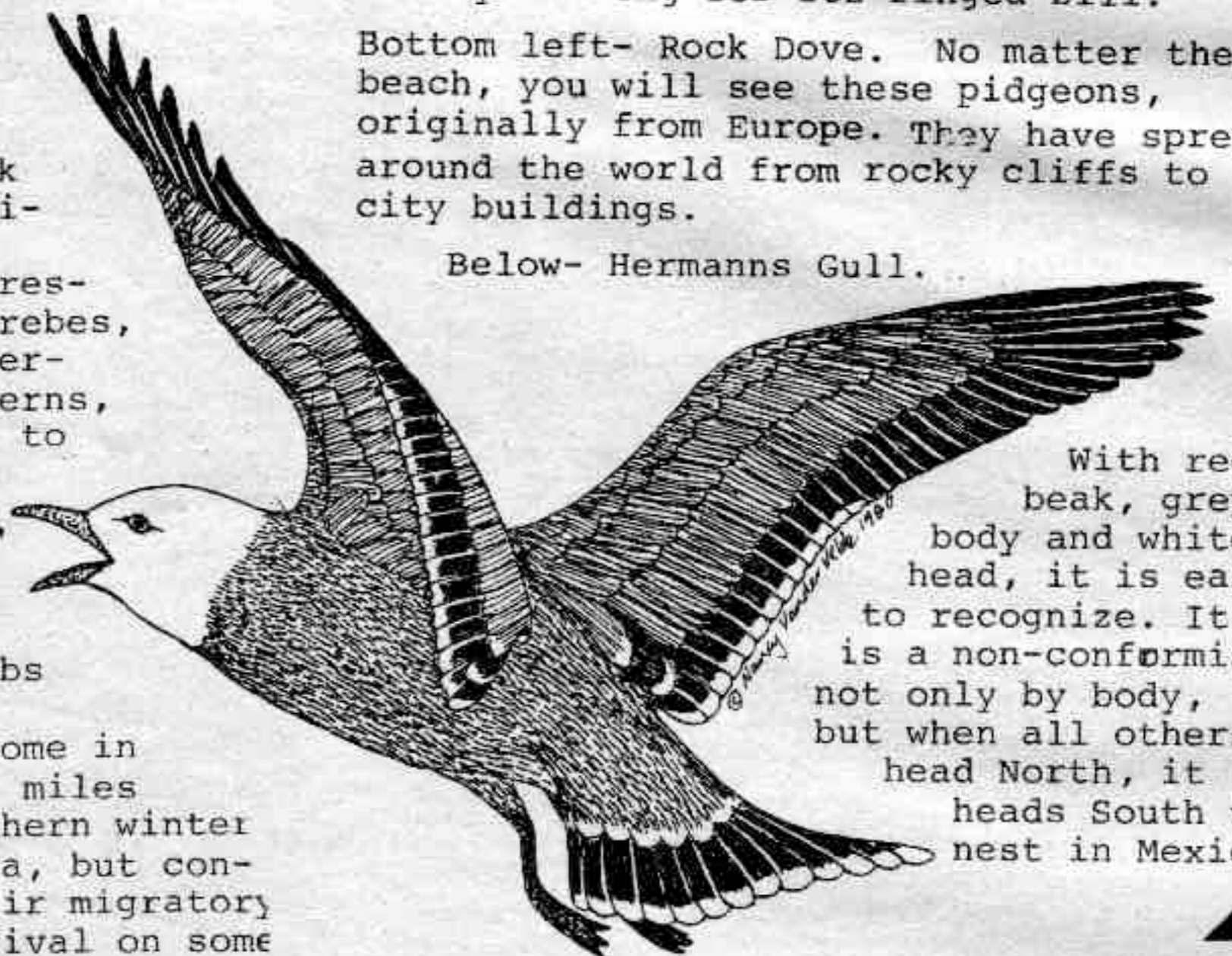

So, if sandy sandwich eaters want to share their noon hour with a motley group of gulls, any day will do. But is sack lunchers are looking for the more cultured side in the study of local maritime ornithology, it is best to wait until a mid-winter ebb tide. Then a square meal can be enjoyed while having a well-rounded view of Southern California's beach birds.
